Bail for pharmacist

THE Sydney pharmacist convicted of illegally supplying 2,400 doses of the Gardasil 9 cervical cancer vaccine for export to Hong Kong has been granted bail pending the outcome of an upcoming appeal.

Katherine Gong was sentenced to eight months in prison last week (**PD** 29 Nov), but her lawyers immediately lodged the appeal with the District Court case now scheduled to be heard on 23 Jan.

Gong pleaded guilty to three counts of prohibition on wholesale supply of certain substances.

Yesterday she was released from custody, with a \$20,000 surety in place and Gong required to surrender her passport among other conditions.

The judge also yesterday ordered a sentencing assessment report to evaluate Gong's suitability for community service.

Her registration as a pharmacist has been suspended since the charges were laid in Oct.

Medicines' dry mouth

DRY mouth induced by certain medicines is the topic of the latest Veterans MATES module.

Noted as particularly common among the elderly, medicine-induced dry mouth can lead to oral and general health damage, significantly impairing quality of life, the material explains.

In 2017 the World Workshop on Oral Medicine VI documented a list of medicines that affect salivary gland function.

The article urges veterans to have regular dental checkups, as a means of reducing hospitalisations, highlighting that poor oral health is associated with major chronic conditions including cardiovascular and respiratory disease as well as diabetes.

NPSA hails CSO changes

THE National Pharmaceutical Services Association (NPSA) says the new guidelines for the Community Service Obligation funding pool (**PD** Mon) will uphold the intent of National Medicine Policy while providing certainty for wholesalers, pharmacies and ultimately patients.

NPSA Chairman Mark Hooper from Sigma Pharmaceuticals hailed the announcement by AstraZeneca to transition away from exclusive-direct arrangements from 01 Feb 2019 (**PD** yesterday), saying it was good news for patients because it means pharmacies can stock medicines from more than one supplier.

"However we still have some concerns about the impact of exclusive-direct arrangements on the sustainability of the CSO model," Hooper added.

Currently Pfizer and Amgen maintain direct distribution into pharmacies, but the updated CSO

Deeds note that medicines subject to exclusive direct deals will not attract CSO payments.

The new Deeds prohibit new exclusive direct supply arrangements after 2020, and Hooper welcomed the arrangements for the CSO pool which supports wholesalers in meeting high regulatory standards such as the distribution of all PBS products to pharmacies - including low-volume and low-value medicines - and the distribution of the full PBS range to rural and remote postcodes, generally within 24 hours, Hooper said.

"The CSO isn't allowing individual companies to gain more control of the market...it's about securing a supply chain that works in patients' best interests.

"That means ensuring all PBS-listed medicines are available to all CSO distributors at equivalent pricing," the NPSA Chairman said.

He said the Association continued to work with Government and the Department of Health "towards ensuring all aspects of patient access to PBS medicines regulated to consistent, high standards".

NPSA members include Sigma, Symbion, API and National Pharmacies.

Pharmacy staff guide limits services

PHARMACY owners in the UK have told the General Pharmaceutical Council (GPhC) that they have been forced to limit services including evening and weekend opening hours in an effort to operate safely, given the GPhC guidelines on staff work load released earlier this year.

In Jun 2018 the GPhC made recommendations around staffing levels in pharmacy but did not nominate a minimum number that should be on duty at any one time.

Pharmacy owners responded with reference to headwinds such as funding cuts, Brexit impacts and a "declining pipeline in newly qualified pharmacists".

Chemists' Own puts children first

PHARMACY-ONLY brand Chemists' Own has highlighted its national 'Help Us Help Our Local Community' initiative aimed at assisting pharmacies to raise money for early learning centres in their local areas.

Those pharmacies which chose to participate were being supported by Chemists' Own to raise money for their preferred local centre by means of in-store donation boxes and sales of the Chemists' Own Children's Range.

One pharmacy from each state will be chosen to receive a \$1,000 Educational Experience voucher to donate to their early learning centre of choice.

As part of the initiative, Chemists' Own has also released a children's activity book that has been distributed to over 1,000 early learning centres and participating pharmacies nationally.

Last year the campaign raised more than \$10,000 nationally - this is now the fourth year of the Help Us Help initiative.

Seqirus adds new flu vax

CSL Limited vaccine offshoot Seqirus has flagged a Therapeutic Goods Administration application for its new quadrivalent Flucelvax QIV, which has been found to be significantly more effective than traditional egg-based vaccines.

An investor update yesterday saw the company release data from a retrospective study of H3N2 cell seed versus egg-based vaccines in the USA, showing a 36% reduction in "influenza-like illness".

Approval may take some time, with Flucelvax QIV anticipated to become available here by 2020.

Other milestones expected next year include the approval of Afluria QIV for children aged 6 months to four years, while Seqirus also expects to lodge a submission for a quadrivalent version of its Fluad immunisation for seniors.

The company said it would double the capacity of its plant in Holly Springs, North Carolina to 50 million doses annually by spending US\$140m on new equipment
