Qld to get RTPM in 2020

REAL-TIME prescription monitoring (RTPM) will be introduced in Queensland in the second half of next year, the State's Minister for Health and Ambulance Services, Steven Miles, says.

The implementation of an RTPM system in Qld moved a step forward on Tue with the passage of the Medicines and Poisons Act and the Therapeutic Goods Act through the state parliament.

"I made a commitment to deliver an RTPM system in Qld in 2020 and passing these Bills is the first major milestone in that process," he said.

"Medicines to be monitored will include controlled drugs such as pharmaceutical opioids and other prescription-only medicines associated with drug dependence and the potential to cause harm, such as benzodiazepines and

products that combine codeine with other medicines."

Pharmacy Guild of Australia National Vice President, Trent Twomey, welcomed the progress, describing it as a common sense move that will benefit vulnerable patients.

"The Guild welcomes the Queensland Government's commitment and action to progress the introduction of real-time prescription monitoring in this State," he said.

"We will continue to work closely with the Government on the introduction of this system to ensure maximum outcomes for patients.

"We also commend Minister Miles for his efforts in driving the introduction of this important system."

RTPM systems are currently in place in Vic, Tas and the ACT.

Human error top healthcare cyber risk

MISTAKES by staff remain the biggest cause of cyber breaches in the healthcare sector, security firm, Kaspersky reports.

In the two years since the Wannacry ransomware attacks crippled healthcare providers around the globe there has been a significant reduction in the number of medical devices attacked.

Kaspersky reported that 30% of hospital devices were infected with a virus in 2017, while attacks impacted just 19% this year.

The Office of the Australian Information Commissioner's latest Notifiable Data Breaches Quarterly Statistics Report to 30 Jun, revealed the health sector experienced the highest number



of breaches of any industry (47) ahead of the financial services sector (42), with human error the top cause of breaches.

However, the healthcare industry was also susceptible to malicious or criminal attacks (22).

Pharmacists take politicians' pulse

CANBERRA pharmacists joined forces with Hearts4Heart to perform pulse-testing on Federal Parliamentarians as part of a national campaign to prevent potentially fatal strokes.

The initiative forms as part of Atrial Fibrillation Awareness Week (16-22 Sep) which aims to address low levels of testing for atrial fibrillation, which increases the risk of stroke five-fold.

"People will often seek advice from pharmacists, and this is an ideal opportunity to detect early warning signs of what could be atrial fibrillation," said Bev Mistry-Cable from Cooleman Court Pharmacy, Weston, ACT. Early detection and timely



referral can make a significant difference

One Hearts4Heart analysis says around 25% of people prescribed an anticoagulant, dangerously cease therapy within 12 months.

Cost barrier to cannabis

QUEENSLAND One Nation Senator, Malcolm Roberts, stirred the medicinal cannabis debate in parliament this week claiming the Federal Minister for Health, Greg Hunt, is playing a "pharmaceutical game" with the medicine.

Urged by the New South Wales Nurses and Midwives Association, Chronic Pain Australia, Epilepsy Action Australia, Cancer Voices, United in Compassion and the Country Women's Association of Australia, Roberts said that even when a patient is legally able to access medicinal cannabis, they often can't afford it, with some scripts costing as much as \$2,000 per month.

"Six thousand six hundred and sixty-seven current approvals is probably no more than 2,000 or 3,000 people actually accessing medical cannabis legally, and it may be even less," Roberts said.

"I have a problem with that level of dishonesty," he added.

Robert's vitriol continued without reference to the need for safety and efficacy trialling of medicinal cannabis products.

"According to Roy Morgan, as many as a million Australians would try medical cannabis as an alternative to their existing medication.

"Minister Hunt has managed to get cannabis into the hands of a measly few thousand, and his department has succeeded in locking millions of people out of medical cannabis.

"In the meantime, many patients are suffering."

The enthused senator then

called upon the Therapeutic Goods Administration to "fast-track the approval of medical cannabis preparations from amongst the Australian growers currently licensed for that purpose."


