PSA welcomes climate strategy

THE Pharmaceutical Society (PSA) of Australia has issued a statement welcoming the government's National Health and Climate strategy, announced earlier this week (PD 06 Dec).

The society's National President Dr Fei Sim thanked Federal Health Minister Mark Butler and Assistant Minister for Health Ged Kearney for their leadership in recognising the impact that climate change has on health.

"Climate change is already having a significant and direct impact not only on the health of every person in Australia, but also on the way we deliver quality health care," she explained.

Sim also highlighted the urgent need to "proactively respond and prepare" for the changing climate by implementing environmentally sustainable practices across the pharmacy and health network.

Guild warns of Sigma and CW merger THE Pharmacy Guild of Australia has stated that the imminent merger of Sigma Healthcare and Chemist Warehouse "poses significant questions and risks" in a statement released Thu night.

Yesterday it was widely reported, including in this publication (PD 07 Dec), that a deal was being worked on which would see Sigma and Chemist Warehouse merge, with the latter finally listed on the ASX after previous float rumours.

This morning, Sigma Healthcare announced the extension of the current trading halt on the ASX as the deal continued to be worked on. According to the Guild statement, significant questions and risks revolve around "patient care, community pharmacy ownership, competition, and the future of CSO wholesaling, which Commonwealth, State and Territory Governments together with regulators, like the Australian Competition and

Dispensary Corner

WE HATE to be the bearer of bad news, but if you want better sleep, you may need to give up sweet treats before bedtime especially if stress is impacting your ability to snooze soundly. New research from

MyFitnessPal shows 60% of Aussies believe their sleep is negatively affected by stress, and 31% turn to sugary or highfat snacks when under pressure.

Those who indulge their sweet tooth late at night, even just once a week, were more likely to report their sleep quality had worsened over the past year (40% vs 20% average).

Despite nine in 10 saying they know sugar isn't the solution when feeling frazzled, nearly a third admit to upping their intake when stressed, with women the most likely to opt for sugary, processed foods.

Sleep nutrition expert Oliva Arezzolo said foods that are high in sugar and fat can wreak havoc on our sleep as they are harder to disgest and keep us alert... talk about not-so-sweet dreams.

THE Community and Pharmacy Support Group (CAPS) has penned a letter this week calling upon doctors to reject the 60-day dispensing policy, which it says is negatively impacting vulnerable patients. "We feel a compelling need to

unite as healthcare professionals." the letter stated.

"Pharmacists and doctors share a common goal - to create the best outcomes for our patients while safeguarding the healthcare industry's foundation."

The document goes on to highlight the "serious adverse effects" of the 60DD policy on patient care by detailing a case study of a retired elderly couple in Parramatta, and their pharmacist Jalal Chami.

The case study demonstrates the "unforeseen challenges" the policy creates for patients with extensive medication needs, as well the increased financial pressure it places on pharmacies.

"If our most vulnerable patients are not only not seeing any benefits from this, but are actually negatively impacted, then this is clearly something that we as healthcare providers need to step up and speak out against," CAPS implored.



"We urge you to reconsider implementing 60-day prescriptions, as they are not only forcing pharmacists to close their doors. cut staff, and reduce free services, but are also impacting the health and financial situations of our vulnerable patients."

"We ask you to join us to voice our concerns and take actions to contribute to a collective effort that shapes policies in the best interest of those who depend on us.

"We call upon you to reject 60-day dispensing, and help us advocate for policies that will truly make a difference for the future of our nation," the letter concluded.

It's not the first time CAPS has called on GPs to take a stance against the controversial policy - in Oct, it asked them to "be mindful" when prescribing 60-day prescriptions (PD 17 Oct). JM

SHPA welcomes \$1.2b funding

THE Society of Hospital Pharmacists of Australia (SHPA) has welcomed new healthcare funding announcements from the government, which will see another \$1.2 billion to strengthen Medicare and support the delivery of more urgent care clinics.

However, pharmacists need to be able to work to their full scope of practice if the efficiency of the healthcare system is to be improved, SHPA President Tom Simpson said.

He said he was also pleased the Prime Minister is talking about implementing hospital avoidance programs for older Aussies, pointing out that half of the 250,000 medicationrelated hospital admissions each year were preventable.

Medication management programs for older Australians in primary care should be a key strategy, Simpson argued, as well as expanding pharmacistled prescribing practices on discharge needs in Australian hospitals, in order to discharge patients earlier.



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Supplement demand soars Down Under

AUSTRALIA is seeing a significant surge in demand for health supplements, with recent research from the CSIRO projecting demand will reach \$5.2 billion by 2030.

An increasing number of Australians are seeking out vitmans, minerals, herbal and protein-based products due to an ageing population, rising health concerns and a shift

towards preventative healthcare, according to EZZ Life Science.

The challenge of maintaining a balanced diet as busy lifestyles become the norm, the trend toward natural and organic products, the influence of TikTok health trends, and the continuous impact of COVID-19, are all thought to be factors that are contributing to the booming health and wellness market.
