SHPA shares PSA's vision

HOSPITAL pharmacists welcomed the *Pharmacists in 2030* report, launched by the Pharmaceutical Society of Australia (PSA) at PSA24.

The report supports pharmacy specialisation, collaborative care teams, and practitioner recognition, aligning with the Society of Hospital Pharmacists of Australia's (SHPA) own strategic vision.

SHPA President Tom Simpson said *Pharmacists in 2030* serves as a complementary framework for SHPA's upcoming *Statement on Advanced Pharmacy* and strategic plan to guide the growing impact of the pharmacy profession on medicines safety and patient care.

"We absolutely recognise the need to update the definition of advanced practice in Australia," remarked Simpson.

The Pharmacists in 2030 recognises "urgent issues" facing the profession, while identifying actionable solutions, many of which echo the initiatives of SHPA's Transformation 2024 agenda, explained Simpson.



Additionally, PSA National President Fei Sim explained that the report "leverages the appetite for change in our health system", driven by patient needs, and provides a roadmap for the next six years on how pharmacists' full potential can be realised.

Sim added *Pharmacists in 2030* "challenges the entire health ecosystem" to collaboratively drive pharmacy practice to the next level, including policymakers, patients, and consumers.

"We know that regulatory change alone is not enough," she said.

"We need to address the cultural and system factors which hold our profession back, and importantly, we cannot continue expecting pharmacists to do more with less."

Training subsidy

THE Australasian College of Pharmacy will now manage Queensland Health's subsidy distribution for pharmacists' training, for the state's Community Pharmacy Scope of Practice pilot (PD 26 Apr).

Announced in Jun, the Queensland Government allocated \$6 million to support the pilot's rollout, making training more accessible.

Eligible pharmacists can receive up to \$7,000 for completing approved clinical educational courses within 18 months of enrolment.

College CEO Amanda Seeto urges pharmacists to apply for the subsidy, noting that some in North Queensland have already completed the training and expanded their services.

Seeto acknowledged the financial support, highlighting its role in enhancing pharmacists' capabilities and healthcare accessibility.

Compounding updates



THE Pharmacy Board of Australia has published revised guidelines on safe practice for compounding medicines, effective 01 Oct.

These updates provide clarity on when compounding is appropriate, supported by a new definition of 'commercial medicine'.

Key changes include a greater focus on risk assessment, reducing duplicated information from sources like the Australian Pharmaceutical Formulary, and differentiating guidelines for animal versus human patients.

The pharmacy board guidelines also outline legal requirements and standards for compounding.

The revised guidelines also reaffirm longstanding guidance for the profession about when not to compound a medicine, with pharmacists advised not to compound medicines if they replicate existing available medicines, lack proper equipment, or if safety is not evidenced.




counselling techniques.

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Dispensary Corner

EAGLE-EYED Olympics watchers may have noticed something a little off with the costume worn by one of the Swiss athletes competing in the mixed relay triathlon this week.

Normally red to signify the Swiss flag of course, one athlete was in a neutral (which in a way, is so very Swiss) white outfit.

This was due to the athlete in question - Simon Westermann - being drafted in as a late substitute after Adrien Briffod was forced to withdraw due to a gastrointestinal infection caused by swimming in the filthy Paris river, the Seine.

It's easy to see why prior to the Olympics, swimming in the Seine was banned for 100 years.

The Swiss weren't the only ones affected by the putrid state of the river, with another French-speaking nation Belgium forced to withdraw the entire team after one member had caught *E. Coli* from the same activity.

Organisers of the Paris 2024 Olympic Games said the water quality in the Seine had been tested on the morning of the race and was deemed to be in "very good" condition, according to the standard of the International Federation of World Triathlon.

Ironically, the headquarters of the World Triathlon's governing authority is in the city of Lausanne, Switzerland.

The state of the Seine has provided no shortage of talking points during the Games, with the individual triathlon events delayed by one day.

Hernia surgeries

HALF of the 435,826 hernia repair procedures in Australia from 2017 to 2021 were for inguinal (groin) hernias, with men accounting for 89.6% of these surgeries, researchers from the University of South Australia found.

The study, published in Critical Public Health, analysed data from the Australian Institute of Health & Welfare, focusing on five types of hernia operations to identify high-risk age groups and genders.

Men aged 60-64 years are most at risk overall, while women are more prone to femoral and incisional hernias.

Women aged 20-39 years are also more likely to undergo epigastric hernia surgery.

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
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
