#### Measles alert

NSW Health has revealed another confirmed case of measles in the Australian Capital Territory, with the infectious person transiting through Sydney.

People at the following locations should monitor for symptoms: Air India flight AI 302 from Delhi to Sydney on 20 Jan at 8.10am, Sydney Airport Terminal 1 International Arrivals on the same day, and the Murrays Bus Sydney to Canberra Express, departing around 10.30am.



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## Scope reforms success



THE New South Wales Govt announced vesterday that 9.000 treatments were delivered under the NSW and the Australian Capital Territory's scope of practice reforms, which saw patients access treatment for uncomplicated UTIs and repeat prescriptions of the oral contraceptive pill from their local pharmacist, according to the Guild.

The reforms commenced in May 2023 with 100 participating pharmacies, and have since expanded to include over 1,000 pharmacies statewide.

Media reports indicate that 8,770 women have received treatment for uncomplicated UTIs across NSW and the ACT, and more than 600 have received a resupply for the oral contraceptive pill, without needing a GP appointment.

"Nine thousand patients have now been treated at their local community pharmacy," confirmed the Pharmacy Guild's NSW branch President David Heffernan.

"This has taken the pressure off hospital emergency departments

#### **Obesity spiked**

**OBESITY** among primary school kids in the UK spiked during the COVID-19 lockdown, with a 45% increase between 2020-2021 among four- and five-year-olds, according to a study in PLOS ONE, HERE. The authors estimated that without reversals, increased obesity rates in Year 6 kids alone will cost society an additional £800m (A\$1,547m) in healthcare.

and freed up GPs to deal with more complex health issues."

The Pharmacy Guild of Australia has also welcomed the NSW Govt's recent announcement that the trial will expand to include skin conditions such as impetigo, shingles and dermatitis.

These and other scope of practice reforms are anticipated to "deliver a total dollar benefit of \$1.6 billion annually to the NSW economy in productivity gains and reduced healthcare costs", as patients are able to access the care they need without presenting to an emergency department or waiting for a GP appointment, according to the Pharmacy Guild.

"Patients should not have to wait weeks to see a GP for everyday healthcare, they need affordable, accessible primary healthcare.

"We are calling on the NSW Govt to deliver on its commitment to allow patients to be treated for 23 everyday health conditions at their local community pharmacy," concluded Heffernan. JG

#### Avoid swimmer's hair



**SWIMMING** is known for its wide range of health and wellbeing benefits, including building muscle strength and reducing stress, but one area it can wreak havoc on is hair and scalp health.

"Chlorine is very much an alkaline product, and it really strips the sebum and the natural oils of the skin, the hair and the scalp," said Dr Li-Chuen Wong, head of dermatology at The Children's Hospital at Westmead, Sydney.

This damage, known as "swimmer's hair", is most common among people who frequently swim in chlorinated pools.

The good news is that most hair and scalp issues can be prevented by using a well-fitting swim cap or tying your hair into a tight bun, which minimises contact with the chlorine, said Wong.

Pre-rinsing hair under a shower before entering the pool is also recommended, as it can act as a barrier and lessen the capacity to absorb chlorinated water.

Doing this again post-swim is also advisable if you can't wash hair with a gentle shampoo and conditioner straight away.

It is important to avoid hot water or prolonged washes that can damage the scalp moisture barrier further, Wong explained.

**IF YOU** consider yourself to be a runner, there is a strong chance that you are also in a high income bracket, according to new research.

A study from the Australian Sports Commission breaks down participation in various sports and activities in Australia by demographic including level of household income.

The data shows a correlation between high earners and running, with higher household income and greater participation in the sport.

Psychologist and interim Dean of the UNSW Business School, Frederik Anseel, offered his reasons why high-income earners are attracted to running.

High earners often have a strong drive for achievement, and their competitiveness easily translates into athletic pursuits.

Peer pressure is a big driver of participation; networking opportunities like run clubs allow members to mix with likeminded corporate types; and lastly, high-stress jobs require mental relief more than others.

# Sigma offer raises \$223m

announced the successful completion of its fully underwritten Retail Entitlement Offer raising approximately \$223 million, including take-up by Sigma's largest and major shareholder, HMC Capital Partners Fund.

The pharma company had gone to the market with the idea of raising approximately \$400 million (Entitlement Offer), which was announced on 11 Dec last year.

Completion of the Retail Entitlement Offer on 19 Jan represents the final stage of Sigma's Entitlement Offer.

The institutional component of the Entitlement Offer closed last year, a Sigma statement confirmed.

Approximately 4,200 valid applications for retail entitlements were received from eligible retail shareholders for approximately 111 million new Sigma shares at the offer price of \$0.70 per new share, raising approximately \$77 million (including applications under the retail oversubscription facility for approximately 12 million new shares).

This represented an aggregate participation rate of approximately 53%, according to the statement.

#### Factors that weigh into trust survey

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THE University of South Australia has launched a survey to seek feedback on the level of "entrustability" or autonomy given to intern pharmacists to complete Entrustable Professional Activity (EPA) statements, and what factors will contribute to a learner pharmacist being entrusted to work more independently.

Principal investigator and PhD student Tarik Al-Diery explained

that participants only need around 10 mins to finish the survey and will have a chance to win a \$100 voucher.

He added participants will be asked to provide their perspective on the level of "entrustability" that should be given to an intern pharmacist for each of the three workplacebased EPAs developed by the Australian Pharmacy Council. Learn more **HERE**.

#### TGA herb recall

LIVE insects were found in two batches of Henry Blooms Herb-a-lax 200g dried herb powder, initiating a TGA recall.

The insect was identified as tobacco beetles, scientifically known as *Lasioderma serricorne*, stated the regulatory body.

Its manufacturer Phytologic Holdings Pty Ltd is recalling Henry Blooms Herb-a-lax 200g dried herb powder with the two batch numbers 22108402 and 22108403.

This recall does not affect any other batch of Henry Blooms Herb-a-lax 200g dried herb powder or any other Henry Blooms' products.

If you or a customer has a bottle of Henry Blooms Herba-lax 200g dried herb powder from any of the above batches, the advice is not to use it, and return it to the place of purchase for a refund.
