HEADS of peak bodies met to discuss the evolving role of pharmacists and the profession's future at the Pharmacy Careers Summit 2024 (PCS24) held last Fri.

The virtual summit saw nearly 1,700 attendees, a significant increase from last year's 1,200.

Key speakers included Tom Simpson, President of the Society of Hospital Pharmacists of Australia, A/Prof Fei Sim, President of the Pharmaceutical Society of Australia (PSA), and Prof Trent Twomey, National President of the Pharmacy Guild of Australia.

Of significance was that all three agreed on the need for collaboration between their groups to advance the profession and improve patient outcomes. Simpson emphasised the importance of hospital pharmacists

in multidisciplinary teams, managing complex medications, and contributing to clinical trials. He highlighted the growth of collaborative prescribing in



hospitals, which improves patient outcomes by ensuring accurate medication management.

Discussing the PSA's advocacy for pharmacists roles in various settings, including aged care and general practice, Sim underscored the importance of pharmacists being "fully utilised wherever medicines are used", aiming for improved patient care and safety through expanded services.

Twomey detailed the recently signed eighth Community Pharmacy Agreement (PD 03 Jun), highlighting its significance in "bringing certainty to the sector", ensuring affordable access to medicines for patients and funding for community pharmacies. He stressed the financial and

and Pharmacy Daily, the PCS24 panel concluded with a call for unity and ongoing advocacy to enhance the role of pharmacists across all healthcare settings. JG

Andrographis alert

FOLLOWING the death of one person last month from a suspected fatal reaction to the andrographis medicine, Armaforce, the TGA is reconsidering whether the current labelling is sufficient to address safety concerns.

Reported reactions included anaphylaxis, seizure, swelling, nausea, throat tightness and dizziness, and patients are being asked to stop using andrographis medicines at the first sign of an allergic reaction.

PSA24's top state finalists

THE Pharmaceutical Society of Australia (PSA) has announced the finalists for the 2024 Pharmacy Student of the Year (PSOTY) competition, who will compete for the top prize at the national conference, PSA24, in Aug.

The PSOTY finalists include: Blake Fraser, University of Technology Sydney; Emily Schrek, La Trobe University; and Bridget Cleary, University of Western Australia.

Also competing will be Tobey Adubasim, University of Tasmania; Hayden Scott, University of Canberra; Shylee-Jade Hadar-Pagliari, James Cook University; and McKinley Nolan, NAPSA's Wildcard finalist from University of Tasmania.

The competition will challenge pharmacy students with real-life clinical scenarios, requiring them to use their clinical knowledge and communication skills to provide patient-centred advice.

A judging panel will evaluate the finalists before selecting the national winner, to be announced at



the PSA24 gala dinner.

The peak body's National President A/Prof Fei Sim said the PSOTY competition showcases the talents of the next generation of pharmacists, giving them the opportunity to develop and grow their skills.

"Award sponsor Viatris, and PSA are excited to see such enthusiastic students entering our profession and dedicating their future to improving the health and wellbeing of our communities."

Sim added that regardless of the outcome, the student finalists are already winners.

IN YEARS gone by, somebody cutting a cigar and lighting up may have been perceived as belonging to the higher end of society, compared to those smoking cigarettes.

But a new joint study by researchers in Portugal and the USA has sought to apply distinct and clear, not perceived, personality traits on people based on how they light up.

According to the research, which appeared in the *Plos One* open-access journal, survey results found smokers in general are less agreeable, but on the plus side are much more extroverted than non-puffers.

This higher extroversion suggested smokers enjoy the social nature of their habit.

Cigar smokers were deemed to be less neurotic, while those who prefer cigarettes have lower self-discipline and are more impulsive, which the report pinned on a propensity of having a total disregard for their own long-term health.

No word yet on those who chew tobacco or use vapes...

Collaboration in a cloud



HEALTH professionals will be better equipped to proactively identify people at risk of diabetes and plan preventative treatment with the help of a new QI program to be launched next week.

The new Diabetes Quality Improvement Program sits within Practice Cloud, a program from leading health informatics company, PenCS.

Features of the new program include helping newly diagnosed sufferers of diabetes to plan and manage their condition and for GPs to improve their prescription use of medicines and work more closely with a patient's local pharmacy.

Diabetes WA Chief Executive, Melanie Gates, said the 23 recommendations tabled in the inquiry's final report covers a wide range of issues.

"We are pleased that the committee has listened to the voices of people living with diabetes, including the submission from Diabetes WA, which featured the voices of so many from our West Australian community," Gates said.

"We have been calling for greater access to vital diabetes technology, including continuous glucose monitors and automated insulin pumps because we know the difference these vital technologies can make to the lives of the West Australians who are living with Diabetes."

According to Diabetes WA, the recommendations will affect the lives of more than 148,000 West Australians who live with diabetes, and the 30 more diagnosed every day.
