Vapes stocked

DESPITE pharmacy chains and many independent stores declaring they won't stock vapes, Federal Health Minister Mark Butler said on radio vesterday that pharmacies have historically offered vapes on prescription.

"Many, many pharmacies stock vapes, as stated in previous paragraph, as it is a useful product for particularly many hardened smokers," commented Butler.

"So this is not new, they've been stocking them for a considerable amount of time."

Pharmacies have clear clinical guidelines for discussing smoking cessation options with patients, including traditional nicotine replacement therapies, e-cigarettes and vapes, he said.

Ultimately, Butler noted, it is up to individual businesses to decide whether to stock vapes.

ECS gets new funding



AUSTRALIAN medicinal cannabis cultivator and manufacturer, ECS Botanics, has received a Victoria Government manufacturing grant of \$118k.

ECS has also secured an extension of its asset finance facility with National Australia Bank (NAB), increasing its funding arrangements by an additional \$3.4 million.

The company will use the funding as part of its expansion into production of live rosin cartridges for both its own-brand and white label products.

The asset finance facility provides ECS with greater flexibility to expand its growing and production facilities without equity dilution, and to boost cannabis production and drive increased sales. The facility is in addition to the existing \$2 million working capital loan from NAB which the company said remains undrawn.

ECS Managing Director Nan-Maree Schoerie, said, "the Victoria Government, grant together with the NAB financing, will help ECS expand our product range into manufacturing and supplying rosin cartridges as well as funding other growth initiatives".

Schoerie explained that in more mature markets, vaping medicinal cannabis cartridges have become increasingly popular.

"Cartridges can reduce the exposure to harmful toxins, have less odour, are less irritating to the throat and are more discreet when compared to inhaling dried flower," Schoerie commented.

"As a result, vape cartridge, as opposed to dried flower, are more convenient, healthier and socially acceptable for patients seeking immediate therapeutic benefits." The production of live rosin

cartridges continues the company's expansion into selected opportunities within the downstream medicinal cannabis sector, Schoerie concluded. JG

Ozempic linked to risk of vision loss

DIABETES and weight loss drug, Semaglutide, has been linked to an increased risk of vision loss, according to new research from the Harvard (T.H. Chan) School of Public Health.

Sold under the brand name Ozempic, the prescription drug may be associated with higher risk of Non-Arteritic Anterior Ischemic Optic Neuropathy (NAION), a condition that typically causes sudden vision loss in one eye due to a loss of blood flow to the optic nerve.

The study, which included 16,827 patients, compared those who were prescribed semaglutide compared with patients who were prescribed non-glucagon-like peptide receptor agonist medications for diabetes or obesity.



The results show that patients who received semaglutide had a greater risk of NAION after three years (6.7% versus 0.8%).

Researchers say that further investigation is needed to assess causality - to read the full study, which is published online at JAMA Ophthalmol, CLICK HERE. JM

Dispensary Corner

YOUR GP or pharmacist is often the first step toward a resolution to whatever ailment you need addressing.

But every industry also has its share of odd professions that might make you scratch your head - unless of course the pharmacist said not to.

Make no mistake though, these more obscure, but very much real jobs are no less important and play a critical role in the health spectrum.

Take one London-based occupational therapist, whose job partly involves taking people with eating disorders out to dinner at restaurants as part of their treatment.

There are also physios who specialises in dizziness and vertigo by conducting physical exercises and massage on a person's ear, a key part of the condition due to its role controlling balance.

AFT's China move

AFT Pharmaceuticals today announced an agreement with Hainan Haiyao Co Ltd to distribute Crystaderm cream in China.

Crystaderm cream is a proprietary product that treats skin infections by the slow release of hydrogen peroxide onto the skin as an alternative to topical antibiotics, which if misused risk development of drug resistant bacteria.

AFT's Managing Director Dr Hartley Atkinson said, "we anticipate the launch will occur during this calendar year, and believe that there is a significant potential for this product in such a large population base".

BP cuffs need recalibration

AN EMERITUS Professor in electrical engineering and telecommunications has identified what he says could be wide-ranging inaccurate blood pressure readings due to calibration in brachial cuffs.

According to a small-scale study published in the Journal of Hypertension, UNSW Professor Branko Celler claims misreadings of Korotkoff sounds or misdetections may lead to significant doubts in the reliability of the dominant tool used in blood pressure readings.

"We've actually known for 100 years or more that we systemically underestimate systolic blood pressure, but we've never had an answer to it," Prof Celler said.

"This is a fundamental and important problem that's been identified, the implication of this study is really quite profound and I acknowledge the fact it's hugely disruptive to current accepted practices," he added.

Prof Celler said his study featured only 40 people - 35 men and five



women with an average age of 64 - and saw tests conducted using both an invasive catheter and the non-invasive brachial cuff.

He said the disruption comes from an accepted norm that effectively, every blood pressure machine worldwide is calibrated using Korotkoff sounds and may, therefore, be in error.

"What we are suggesting is that improvements need to be made to eliminate the sources of error we have identified."

Avoid a vax error and check cut-off dates

THE Victorian Department of Health is emphasising this week that vaccine errors are preventable, and healthcare providers must adhere to strict protocols to ensure the safe administration of vaccines such as Rotarix for children.

Prior to administering the vaccine, it is essential to verify the patient's identity by checking their full name and date of birth as upper age limits with cut-off dates apply.

Identifying any contraindications and precautions specific to Rotarix is crucial, along with performing a thorough prevaccination screening checklist.



Additionally, providers should review existing immunisation records, such as the Australian Immunisation Register, Learning and Development book (Green book), and medical notes, before proceeding with vaccination.

Any vaccine errors must be reported to SAFEVIC for assessment and clinical advice, stated the govt department.

Guild Update

Concerns over vaping voiced

COMMUNITY pharmacies, banner and industry groups have voiced strong opinion against the new legislation which allows the OTC sale of vaping products in stores.

They claim it undermines their role in ensuring access to safe, therapeutic smoking cessation products.

National Pharmacies Chief Pharmacist Bec Rogers commented, "these vaping products are unregulated, untested, unproven".

"We basically don't have the evidence to show that they're safe and effective."

Chemist Warehouse's Mario Tascone questioned future liability, "what if we end up finding, like cigarettes, in 30 years time that people have cancers, who then is liable?"

Pharmacy 777's spokesperson added, "[Selling vapes] undermines the professional role of pharmacists".

Emmanuel Vavoulas of Blooms The Chemist highlighted the health risks, "vapes are potentially harmful products...which goes against our purpose".

Catherine Bronger of the Pharmacy Guild of Australia summed it up, "we're not policemen - we're pharmacists and we should not have to police these items within our community pharmacies". Learn more CLICK HERE.
