

Concerns invited on Sigma-CW merger

THE reverse takeover of Sigma by Chemist Warehouse (CW) will increase prices, reduce service quality and degrade the healthcare available through the community pharmacy network, according to the Pharmacy Guild of Australia.

The peak body is urging all parties to make their submission on the specific Issues of Concern (*PD* 13 Jun) to the ACCC by 27 Jun.

The main problems are that structural market change may raise barriers to entry and expansion, particularly for independent pharmacies, and reduce competition in pharmacy retailing.

Delayed ovulation

It is also the preferred choice for those with a BMI≥26kg/m². See more on the **cover page**. Also of alarm is the closure of community pharmacies currently supplied by wholesaler Sigma.

Further issues are over the access and use of Sigma-supplied independent pharmacies' data, reduced community pharmacy competition, and the closure of rival suppliers.

The Guild is asking state and territory governments, through their pharmacy regulators, to continue to scrutinise complex business models for compliance with existing community pharmacy ownership laws.

In an ASX statement yesterday, Sigma CEO and Managing Director Vikesh Ramsunder said, "we are co-operating closely with the ACCC and look forward to continuing to do so in the next phase of the merger review".

"The proposed transaction will ensure that Sigma, consistent with its regulatory obligations, can continue to serve franchisee and independent pharmacies alike with a competitive offering, whilst delivering a transformational change for all Sigma stakeholders."

ACCC anticipates making a final decision on 05 Sep, however, this timeline can change.

Brodaty awarded

PROF Henry Brodaty, co-Director of the Centre for Healthy Brain Ageing, was awarded last week for lifetime service to dementia research and care at the 2024 Australian Dementia Research Forum.

Brodaty is responsible for the establishment of the Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders Society in NSW in 1982, which grew into Dementia Australia, and sparked a global movement, Alzheimer's Disease International, which includes 120 national associations.

Reflecting on his career, the lifetime award winner said, "it's been an incredible journey and one which continues to excite me".

"The community is hungry for news, especially as our population ages," said Brodaty.

"And today, when for the first time those aged over 64 outnumber children aged under 15, more of us are worried," he added.

"Dementia is such a superb paradigm for the complexity of healthcare, and clinicians, researchers, aged care providers and policy makers need to grapple with medical, psychiatric, social, policy and economic issues," said Brodaty.

"Those affected are grateful for the help we can give them and for the research that may benefit them and their children and grandchildren."

Brodaty has published over 800 papers and book chapters, receiving numerous accolades, including the Order of Australia in 2000 as well as the International Ryman Prize in 2016.

Checks drop again

THE Australian Institute of Health and Welfare has released the National Bowel Cancer Screening Program Monitoring Report 2024, revealing a continued decline in participation, dropping to 40% from 40.9% in 2021.

Six million Aussies aged 50-74 were invited to participate in the free program, yet six in 10 did not return their free bowel cancer screening test.

"This is the second consecutive year of declining NBCSP participation rates since 2020, which is of concern, given the program's life-saving potential as 99% of bowel cancer cases can be successfully treated when detected early," said Bowel Cancer Australia (BCA) CEO Julien Wiggins.

In 2022, 64,932 participants (5.7%) received a positive result, indicating blood in their stool that required further investigation via colonoscopy.

Only 13.5% of these people received a colonoscopy within the recommended 30-day timeframe, down from 15.6% in 2021.

Waiting times varied between 133 and 197 days, depending on location.

"The opportunity for early detection is lost if a positive screening result is not promptly followed by a colonoscopy," added Wiggins.

BCA also welcomed a milestone in its campaign, with the NBCSP screening age lowered from 50 to 45.

Starting 01 Jul, eligible participants aged 45-49 can opt-in for their first free bowel cancer screening test (*PD* 16 May).

Colvin appointed as Red Cross CEO

THE Australian Red Cross has announced the appointment of Andrew Colvin as its new Chief Executive Officer.

The peak body's President Charles Burkitt said, "Colvin's proven leadership and deep understanding of crisis management will be invaluable as we continue to respond to the evolving needs of communities across Australia and beyond".

"His clear dedication to public service also aligns perfectly with our mission to alleviate human suffering and build resilient communities," said Burkitt.

Colvin, who previously led the National Bushfire Recovery Agency after the 2019-2020 Black Summer, has recently been a partner at Deloitte Australia.

Based in Canberra, Colvin will commence his role on 01 Jul.

Health spend up

THE Commonwealth Bank of Australia (CBA) has released its **Household Spending Insights** (HSI) Index which investigates the spending habits of more than seven million Australians to understand spending patterns and provide insights into how the Australian economy is performing.

Health experienced a slight increase in spending for May, up just 0.5%, following on from a small 0.9% increase in Apr.

The largest health spending in May was from GPs, pharmacies and other specialist services, which was offset by reduced spending on fertility services, ophthalmologists, dermatologists and medical equipment stores.
