NSW skin trial starts in Jul

NSW pharmacists will be able to treat common skin conditions under a new clinical trial from 12 Jul, announced the state's Health Minister Ryan Park today.

During the trial, trained pharmacists will offer treatments for impetigo, shingles, cellulitis and mild plaque psoriasis (*PD* 18 Jun).

The trial will commence in a staged process with pharmacies across the state onboarded gradually until Sep.

The Pharmacy Guild of Australia stated that under the trial, NSW Health will reimburse pharmacies for consultation fees, ensuring that patients are not out of pocket for the service.

"This will make a real difference for patients," said David Heffernan, Guild's NSW branch President.

"This trial will mean even more healthcare options, taking pressure off hospital emergency departments and freeing up GPs to treat more complex conditions."

The Minister's announcement

follows the successful conclusion of the state's trial of UTI treatment by pharmacies, which has seen over 17,000 patients treated since May last year.

"The success of the UTI trial shows that people value options for affordable, accessible everyday healthcare," Heffernan added.

"Community pharmacies across NSW are ready to do more to help provide patients with primary healthcare they need." *JG*

Set up new guide

THE Pharmaceutical Society of Australia (PSA) will work with the government to support pharmacists who choose to be involved in the prescribing and dispensing of nicotine-containing therapeutic vapes.

National President Fei Sim said that while the amended vaping bill is not PSA's preferred model, now that legislation has passed both houses of Parliament (*PD* breaking news), "our focus will be firmly on supporting pharmacists to get through these changes".

"People will not be able to buy vapes on request - they must take part in a therapeutic consultation with a pharmacist who will prescribe a therapy based on clinical need."

The PSA will develop bestpractice guidelines to prescribe smoking-cessation products including vapes.

Facilitated by Monash University's Prof Kirstie Galbraith, UniSA's Dr Jacinta Johnson and La Trobe's Prof Joe Tucci, the session will explain in-depth the Bachelor of Pharmacy and Master of Pharmacy programs, and the importance of clinical placements to attendees.

A student panel featuring Angus Barnes from Newcastle University, Mia Curigliano from Monash University, and Caspar Townsend from Curtin University will provide lived experience awareness when studying pharmacy, highlighting the degrees' challenges and rewarding aspects.

A CPS spokesperson told **Pharmacy Daily** the council is confident that attendees will



find the session "informative and uplifting, because a pharmacy career offers many exciting opportunities across a variety of professional settings".

"Our expert panel has some great advice, especially if you are contemplating a degree in this area," he added.

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Dispensary Corner

RESEARCHERS have found that certain gut bacteria make us crave food like crazy, while others keep us on the straight and narrow.

Presenting the discovery at the Federation of European Neuroscience Societies (FENS) Forum 2024, researcher Prof Elena Martin-Garcia from Pompeu Fabra University revealed that food-addicted mice had more of the bad bacteria (proteobacteria), and less of the good ones (actinobacteria and blautia).

Humans, it turns out, have similar gut dramas that pharmacists are asked to help out with every day.

But here's the funny revelation: the scientists found that feeding mice prebiotics like lactulose and rhamnose boosted the good bacteria and curbed their munchies.

Imagine a mouse swapping cheese for kale.

In a sci-fi twist, lead researcher Prof Rafael Maldonado and his team also tinkered with the mice's brain genetics, making them more likely to crave snacks.

This gut-brain connection is like a bizarre soap opera where your stomach and brain are in cahoots to raid the fridge.

FENS committee member Prof Richard Roche from Maynooth University added that this research could lead to new medical treatments for our snack attacks.

So, when you reach for a donut, blame it on your gut bacteria - they're the real masterminds behind your cravings.

Lose kilos and not bone

NEW research has found that the combination of exercise and an Ozempic-like drug helps people shift weight, while maintaining bone density.

Conducted at the University of Copenhagen and Hvidovre Hospital, the study aimed to find out whether these new weight-loss drugs impact bone health, which is still largely unknown.

A concern with weight loss is that bone density loss can occur in people at the same time.

The study, published in JAMA Network Open, involved 195 obese adults, where the combination of weight loss drug and exercise maintained hip, spine, and forearm bone mineral density (BMD), despite significant weight loss.

However, GLP-1 RA alone reduced BMD at the hip and spine compared to placebo or exercise alone.



The randomised clinical trial highlights that adding exercise to a GLP-1 RA treatment, such as liraglutide, is an effective strategy for weight loss while protecting bone health.

Over a year, participants on the combined regimen saw the best results, maintaining BMD levels at key sites.

These findings emphasise balanced weight loss approaches that account for both weight reduction and bone health are crucial in managing obesity and preventing osteoporosis. *JG*

Al-driven platform

RESEARCHERS from Flinders University are establishing an integrated public health and clinical data platform, SMART-PH, to tackle current and future healthcare challenges such as pandemics and natural disasters.

Led by A/Prof Courtney Ryder from the College of Medicine and Public Health, the initiative aims to change how public health data is used.

"Healthcare has faced unprecedented challenges since COVID-19, and diverse populations in Australia are now confronting a healthcare crisis," said Ryder.

She highlighted the rising incidence of chronic and complex conditions, the financial burden on the healthcare system, the impact of climate-induced natural disasters, and the challenge of equitable access to health.

Ryder pointed out that limited access to real-time, high-quality public health data hampers effective healthcare planning and management, particularly in remote and rural areas.

The SMART-PH platform, driven by AI, aims to address these issues by providing a cohesive public health framework that unites authorities, healthcare institutions, and laboratories.







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





