# PSA's credentialed members package

THE Pharmaceutical Society of Australia (PSA) has unveiled a comprehensive membership package designed to provide robust support for credentialed pharmacists throughout their professional journey.

The announcement was made last Fri by PSA National President A/Prof Fei Sim (pictured) at the Credentialed Pharmacist Conference (CPC) in Cairns.

The membership package includes dedicated resources and support tailored for Australian credentialed pharmacists, along with educational opportunities aimed at their continuous professional development.

One significant component of the package is the Medication Management Review (MMR) recognition of prior learning (RPL) pathway, pending accreditation by the Australian Pharmacy Council.

The pathway allows qualified community pharmacists to transition to the new program



by completing a short bridging assessment or presenting evidence of prior learning.

PSA confirmed its Professional Plus members will have complimentary access to MMR RPL, and will receive an exclusive discount on RPL for the aged care credential, which is a prerequisite for practice in the Aged Care Onsite Pharmacist program.

Sim added, "we established in-house accreditation services, a public directory, and are currently undergoing accreditation of our credentialing process for MMRs

and Aged Care, which is set to recognise the experience of practising consultant pharmacists".

"I am happy to again confirm that this process will be free-of-charge for PSA Professional Plus members, making the transition more affordable and accessible."

Sim mentioned that PSA's support for credentialed pharmacists is also growing, including access to PSA's regular Clinical Update, which can help keep them on top of emerging clinical evidence from around the world, and discounts to all PSA conferences, including CPC25. JG

#### PTSD care funding

**RESEARCHERS** at Southern Cross University have been awarded more than \$3.8 million to help Northern Rivers locals affected by the devastating 2022 floods.

In an unique approach, the researchers will implement a stepped care model to support over 200 people left with post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) after the disaster.

To date, researchers stated there have been very few clinical trials focused on recovery from disaster-related PTSD, and none have focused on a stepped care model.

Stepped care is an evidence-based system for treating mental health, involving a hierarchy of treatments, from least to most intensive.

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# Dispensary Corner

**IN A** spirited exploration at the molecular level, scientists have unearthed fascinating insights into how our choice of beverage temperature impacts our taste buds, with implications for health and pharmacy.

Lead researcher Lei Jiang from the Chinese Academy of Sciences reminisces about the eureka moment shared over a cold beer, pondering the unique alcohol concentrations found in baijiu, a popular Chinese spirit.

Their journey led them to the lab, where they uncovered a molecular dance between ethanol and water molecules.

At lower concentrations, ethanol forms cozy pyramidshaped clusters around water molecules, while at higher concentrations, it prefers to march in orderly chains.

Temperature, it turns out, plays a important role in this molecular ballet.

Chilling a beverage encourages more chain-like structures, resulting in a stronger "ethanollike" taste perception.

This finding sheds light on why a cold beer may pack a punch, even with the same alcohol content as its warmer counterpart.

But beyond the realm of taste, these discoveries hold promise for health and pharmacy.

By understanding the molecular intricacies behind taste perception, pharmaceutical companies may leverage this knowledge to develop more palatable medications or enhance drug delivery systems.

# Putting patients at the centre

MEDICAL research produces better outcomes when people with lived experience are involved in the process, according to Breast Cancer Network Australia (BCNA).

The consumer organisation has welcomed the Australian Government's \$1.89 billion 'Health Research for a Future Made in Australia' funding package, and highlighted the importance of involving consumers in research.

Announced last week by Health Minister Mark Butler, the package includes \$1.4 billion for new research projects via the Medical Research Future Fund, including in priority areas such as women's health and chronic pain.

"Despite progress in treating significant diseases such as breast cancer, which affects over 20,000 people in Australia each year, there are still huge disparities in outcomes," said BCNA Director



of Policy, Advocacy & Support Services, Vicki Durston.

"Investing in Australian medical research is vital in improving outcomes but is most effective when people with lived experience are central and the research is designed to find solutions to meet their needs."

More clinical trials are needed, particularly in rural and regional areas where distance can act as a barrier to consumer participation, Durston emphasised.

She also advocated for research agendas to be influenced by consumer needs as opposed to just commercial interests. *JM*

### AMA calls for road trauma data sharing

FOLLOWING Queensland's commitment to provide road trauma data to the Federal Government, the Australian Medical Association (AMA) is now urging all jurisdictions to follow suit.

AMA President Prof Steve Robson praised Federal Transport Minister Catherine King's announcement to mandate data sharing on road accidents in the upcoming fiveyear road funding agreement.

"Put simply, a nationally consistent data set to provide better understanding of the causes of road crashes would save countless lives," Robson said.

"By having these crucial insights and data, investments can be directed to where they

are needed most - contributing to effective road safety and transport infrastructure policy."

Recent statistics reveal a concerning 8.2% rise in road fatalities, with 1,286 lives lost in Australia over the past 12 months up to Mar.

The AMA has long advocated for uniform data sharing, stressing its crucial role in addressing the grim consequences of road trauma faced by health professionals daily.

"It's highly disappointing that state and territory governments have been gatekeeping important data on road accidents," Robson said, emphasising its necessity to achieve the National Road Safety Strategy's goal of zero deaths and serious injuries by 2050.
