#### FIP on SF medicines

FOR the just passed World Patient Safety Day, the International Pharmaceutical Federation (FIP) launched a curriculum for addressing the risk of substandard and falsified (SF) medical products sold online.

The curriculum is an FIP handbook for educators, and explains that SF medical products threaten patient safety, pose challenges to treat infections such as malaria and antimicrobial resistant diseases, and result in a lack of public trust in healthcare systems.

### Wesfarmers' new fulfilment centre



**WESFARMERS** Health has commenced construction on its new API Cairns Fulfilment Centre, marked by a groundbreaking ceremony attended this week by local dignitaries, including Federal MP Warren Entsch and Cairns Deputy Mayor Brett Olds.

Wesfarmers stated the project will create hundreds of construction jobs and permanent positions once the centre opens in Oct 2025.

The new facility will serve over 120 pharmacies from Cairns to

Thursday Island, aiming to boost product availability, incorporating advanced technology and solar panels for sustainability.

Doug Swan, Executive General Manager of API, said, "this facility will help make health and wellness more accessible and affordable".

Present at the event, Pharmacy **Guild National President Trent** Twomey said, "pharmacies play a critical role in Australia's healthcare system and rely on wholesalers like API to deliver medicines to our businesses".

### ACT Labor pledges more scope if it wins

IF RE-ELECTED, ACT Labor has pledged to expand pharmacists' roles, allowing them to treat common conditions like earaches, acne, nausea, and reflux at community pharmacies.

The Pharmacy Guild of Australia's ACT Branch welcomed this commitment, which would align the Territory with recent changes in New South Wales, granting Canberrans greater access to healthcare for acute and chronic conditions.

ACT branch President Simon Blacker, alongside Chief Minister Andrew Barr and Health spokesperson Rachel Stephen-Smith, made the announcement at TerryWhite Chemmart Compounding in Ainslie yesterday.

"With one in 10 Canberrans waiting over three weeks for a GP appointment and emergency departments overwhelmed, expanding pharmacists' scope of practice is crucial," Blacker said.

He added that 93% of Canberrans support pharmacists working to their full capacity.


Labor's plan would also enable pharmacists to administer vaccines for all ages and participate in expanded healthcare services, helping to ease the pressure on the ACT health system and improve patient outcomes.



# BHI: demand for ED grows in NSW

**THE** Bureau of Health Information (BHI) has released its latest *Healthcare Quarterly* report, showing continued growth in demand for emergency department (ED) and ambulance services in NSW from Apr to Jun 2024.

ED attendances reached 795,817 during the quarter, a 3.3% rise from the same period in 2023 - highlighted by all the peak pharmacy organisations who continue to call for expanded scope of practice to deal with the mounting pressures on hospitals.

Ambulance activity set a new record with 385,345 responses, up 7.8% from the same period in 2023.

Despite this increase, response times remained steady.

BHI Chief Executive Dr Diane Watson noted the rising demand for ED and ambulance services across the state.

"Our analysis has shown that since 2017-18, ED attendances have grown faster than the population, while ambulance



responses also grew faster in the last year of analysis alone," Dr Watson commented.

The report also highlighted an increase in patients presenting with urgent conditions, with more cases categorised in the three most serious triage levels than in any previous quarter since 2010.

However, only 63.7% of patients began treatment on time, down 2.1 percentage points from the same quarter last year.

The report also revealed that 59,105 elective surgeries were performed from Apr to Jun 2024, with a significant drop in patients

waiting longer than clinically recommended, from 9,107 in 2023 to 1,859 in 2024.

BHI also released *The insights* series - Patients' experiences of hospital care over time, which surveyed over 200,000 patients since 2018.

The report showed improvements in how ED staff monitored patients while waiting, but a decline in patients feeling involved in discharge decisions.

Dr Watson emphasised that better patient experiences can enhance clinical outcomes and reduce hospital readmissions. *JG* 

#### Early birth control

A MONASH University-led study highlights the importance of early contraception access for mothers of newborns, often overlooked amid postnatal adjustments and newborn care.

The research found that timely information and services can support family planning, help space pregnancies, and improve health outcomes for both mothers and babies.

The study, published in the *Medical Journal of Australia*, surveyed general practitioners' views on providing contraceptive care during the routine six-week postnatal check-up.

Offering contraceptive care at this stage can prevent unintended pregnancies and improve the wellbeing of women and their families, said researchers from the SPHERE Centre of Research Excellence at Monash University.

### Dispensary Corner

A 61-YEAR-OLD woman developed blurry vision after using a hair dye, and the culprit wasn't a bad haircut.

According to researchers, the likely cause was a chemical in the dye called aromatic amines, which they've cleverly dubbed Retinopathy Associated with Hair Dye Aromatic Amines or RAHDAA - because who doesn't love an acronym?

The woman's vision issues started days after dyeing her hair, leaving her with a less-thanstellar view of her fresh look.

Luckily, four years later, after switching to a dye free of aromatic amines, her vision was back to normal, and she never had a repeat episode.

Experts believe this condition is either rare or underdiagnosed - because who's going to connect their blurry vision to a hair makeover?

Researchers in JAMA recently highlighted a few similar cases, revealing that this might not be a one-off.

So, the next time you're tempted to touch up those greys, double-check the ingredients in your dye, as after all, no one wants to lose their eyesight just to look fabulous.

Moral of the story: Sometimes, it's better to go grey than to squint your way through life.



### Low grasp of ADR tools

A UNIVERSITY of South Australia study has found that only 36% of adults who experienced adverse drug reactions (ADR) reported them to health authorities.

Most of the 544 participants were unaware of the digital tools available for reporting ADRs, such as the Therapeutic Goods Administration's website, phone, or email.

In Australia, medication-related harm accounts for up to 3% of hospital admissions, leading to an estimated 250,000 cases annually and costing \$1.4 billion (*PD* 17 Sep).

A \$1.7 million NHMRC grant is supporting UniSA researchers in developing consumer-friendly digital tools to improve ADR reporting and reduce healthcare costs.

Lead researcher Mohammed Dedefo said that international studies show digital tools can



double ADR reporting, but awareness in Australia remains low.

The current ADR system is mainly used by pharma companies but increasing public awareness of these tools could significantly improve drug safety monitoring, he commented.

Researchers suggest integrating reporting options into healthcare apps and social media platforms to increase awareness.

Co-author A/Prof Lisa Kalisch Ellett added that more reporting would allow the TGA to better assess medication safety, update information, or withdraw harmful drugs when necessary. *JG* 

### Pharmacist guilty

THE Health Care Complaints Commission has prosecuted pharmacist Felix Yue Sing Chan before the NSW Civil and Administrative Tribunal.

Chan was convicted of unlawfully obtaining benefits under the National Health Act 1953 while owning three pharmacies in the ACT and NSW between 2018 and 2020.

Additionally, Chan failed to notify the National Board within seven days of being charged and convicted of these offences.

On 03 Sep, Chan was found guilty of professional misconduct and unsatisfactory conduct, resulting in the cancellation of his registration with a non-review period of nine months.

He was also reprimanded for failing to notify the Board.


