Calls for naloxone, pill checks reignited

VICTORIAN Coroner David Ryan has published the findings from an inquest into the deaths of four people in Broadmeadows last year, with experts calling for more pill checking services and increased awareness around the use of naloxone to reverse nitazene overdose effects.

The people aged between 17 and 42 died after ingesting what they believed was cocaine, but subsequent toxicological analysis revealed it to be protonitazene, a highly potent synthetic opioid.

Coroner Ryan noted the Coroners Prevention Unit has reported 23 confirmed nitazene-involved overdose deaths in Victoria, with the first death occurring in 2021.

The Coroner emphasised the importance of drug checking services, and also recommended the Department of Health consider the effectiveness of nitazene test strips and whether they can be made available to the community as a measure to reduce

unintentional overdose.

Opioid expert Professor Suzanne Nielsen, Deputy Director of the Monash Addiction Research Centre, said, "This tragic case underscores the urgency of expanding drug checking services in Victoria."

"A fixed-site service with the capability of accurately detecting nitazenes offers a critical opportunity to detect substances before they cause harm.

"It's a proactive step toward reducing preventable deaths by giving people real-time information about what they're taking and connecting them with harm reduction support."

She said while nitazene test strips are a "promising tool", they are still being validated and cannot detect all types of nitazene drugs.

She called for increased access to, and public awareness of naloxone, noting there is "good evidence" it can reverse nitazene overdoses if administered in time.

NT Health, after finding nitazenes



for the first time in tablets last week, has urged people to carry naloxone nasal spray or prefilled injection if they are using drugs such as cocaine, ketamine, methamphetamine, MDMA or opioids, or at a party where they will be consumed.

Pill checking services in Qld were recently defunded, despite the increased risk of nitazenes in illicit drugs and prescription medicines such as oxycodone and benzodiazepines (**PD** 09 Apr). KB



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Dispensary Corner

A PHARMACY worker in Ireland had a self-professed "moment of madness" that led him to steal more than €600 (A\$1,250) worth of perfume and cosmetics, a court has heard.

Paul O'Mahoney, aged 42, and another employee pocketed the goods after scanning them and cancelling the sales, in what has been described as two premeditated till frauds.

O'Mahoney, who had been working at a Boots perfume counter in Ireland, pleaded guilty to the theft at Blanchardstown District Court, with his defence saying, "to this day, [he] doesn't know what came over him".

He was captured on CCTV carrying out the thefts on 15 Nov last year with a female coworker, whose case is yet to be heard.

O'Mahoney had no prior convictions, and according to his defence solicitor, he "absolutely regrets the decision" and has "wholeheartedly" apologised.

The former Boots worker was fined €300 (A\$625).

Set up for internship success

HAVING a positive experience as an intern can make all the difference to setting up for a successful career in pharmacy.

Khanh Nguyen (pictured), National Intern Training Program & Vaccination Manager at the Australasian College of Pharmacy (ACP), told Pharmacy Daily that the internship journey is a rewarding experience, but can also involve challenges such as balancing work, study and other enjoyable activities outside of the workplace.

Nguyen, who will be presenting on a panel, 'Setting yourself up for a successful intern year' at the 2025 Pharmacy Careers Summit, said that pharmacy practice environment, preceptor and pharmacy team are important considerations for a successful internship year.

"The Australasian College of Pharmacy congratulates all pharmacy interns and students who have selected a career in pharmacy," said Nguyen.

"It's an exciting time for the profession as pharmacists continue to expand their roles and responsibilities by practicing to their full scope around the country," she added.

People attending the panel



will learn how to plan the intern year to ensure assessments and revision periods are scheduled in accordance with work rosters.

"Key exam dates, conferences and annual leave should be calendarised and communicated with your employer," suggested Nguyen.

The session will also share advice about how to grow your network and create a supportive learning environment to maximise your intern experience.

"Interns should connect with fellow interns, ITP clinical tutors and pharmacy industry experts who can listen, advise and offer guidance to ensure the intern year is a smooth and memorable one," Nguyen recommended.

BMI good indicator of obesity for most

A US study of around 2,000 adults has found that almost all people identified as having obesity based on body mass index (BMI) were confirmed as having excess body fat.

The use of BMI to diagnose obesity has become increasingly controversial.

Recently, a group of experts argued that obesity may be overdiagnosed because BMI does not distinguish between body fat, muscle and bone mass, and recommended that health professionals should look at other measures alongside BMI (PD 15 Jan).

The authors of the current study compared BMI and direct body fat measurement using DEXA, and found a strong correlation between BMI and excess body fat, with 98.4% of persons with BMI-diagnosed obesity having it confirmed.

Results were consistent across

age, sex, and race and ethnicity. While certain types of people, such as athletes, may warrant further evaluation, these people make up a very small portion of the population, the authors noted.
