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## StrongRoom nears a sale

ADMINISTRATORS of failed pharmacy software start-up StrongRoom AI are edging close to a sale of the company, with secured debts transferred to myMedKit owner and entrepreneur, Joe Zhou, according to the Australian Financial Review.

A new business registered earlier this month as SRSPV by Zhou is now one of two secured creditors of the collapsed software company, with more than 40 other unsecured creditors still in line.

Administrators HLB Man Judd, which took control last month (*PD* 31 Mar), are working to facilitate the sale of StrongRoom AI after the company was accused of fraud by major investor EVP.

The company said StrongRoom misrepresented its finances and lost significant sums of money each month, compared to strong profits and revenues being projected in stock valuations.

software businesses and brands, including Aceso Group and its platform Ace Pharmacy, which is similar to StrongRoom as it also digitises pharmacy paperwork and works to improve efficiency.

Zhou told the *AFR* that StrongRoom could potentially be a strategic partner for Ace Pharmacy but declined to say he was aiming for a full takeover of the brand.

HLB Man Judd has so far received more than 10 bids for a takeover of StrongRoom AI despite ongoing legal dramas and debts.

The company's assets remain frozen as Federal Court hearings continue to play out. *ML*

## Neuropathic pain update

A GLOBAL research initiative looking at new evidence and emerging technologies has led to a revision of neuropathic pain treatment recommendations.

Three medication classes are recommended for first line use: alpha-2 delta ligands (gabapentin, pregabalin); serotoninnorepinephrine reuptake inhibitors; and tricyclic antidepressants.

While only demonstrating small benefits, capsaicin and lidocaine patches and capsaicin creams are recommended as second-line treatments due to their high safety and tolerability.

Evidence was inconclusive for spinal cord stimulation, selective serotonin reuptake inhibitors and ketamine.

The team recommended against cannabis-based products, which were found to be ineffective. Up to 10% of Australians have

neuropathic pain - or nerve pain caused by damage to nerves due to disease, surgery or trauma.

"Neuropathic pain affects people differently, so the guideline supports the provision of highquality patient-centred care, that considers needs, values and preferences," said Michael Ferraro of Neuroscience Research Australia (NeuRA), who was involved in the international team.

"Treatment choices depend on potential effectiveness, safety, accessibility, comorbidities and use of other medicines." Ferraro added.

Future revisions may include a focus on other non-drug, nonsurgical interventions, such as exercise, which are currently lacking, and should be prioritised for future research. Read the report HERE. KB

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## Dispensary Corner

WHILE long-haul passengers may welcome care packs, including an eye mask, ear plugs, toothbrush and comb, when recently given to "corridor patients" in a UK hospital, these comforts only left them bemused.

With hospital bed shortages at crisis levels, patients are increasingly left for hours or even days on trolleys, chairs or temporary beds in hospital corridors, with dedicated "corridor medics" (an actual position title) to staff them.

That the care packs also contained a bottle of water, and "do not disturb" and "wake me for up for food" stickers to put on the eye masks, did little to put patients in a holiday mood.

"You could hear people screaming, shouting, fights happening in A&E, in the reception, police coming past, and then you've got complete strangers just staring because where else are they meant to look?" complained one patient, though this could still account for many a holiday experience.

If the well-meaning efforts of staff didn't go down well with patients, UK Health Minister Karin Smyth was similarly unimpressed, and reportedly said it is "unacceptable" that corridor care had become routine in the NHS and the practice "must end".

Giving patients vanity packages risked "normalising" this type of care, she added.

The bed shortage is driven by so-called 'bed blockers' - patients well enough to be discharged but unable to get care at home.
