Presolol 100 SSSI

THE Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA) has been advised by Alphapharm that its Presolol 100 (labetalol hydrochloride 100mg) tablets, used to treat hypertension, are in shortage until 03 Oct 2025 due to manufacturing issues.

Presolol 200 (labetalol hydrochloride 200mg) tablets are available, and a **Serious Scarcity Substitution** Instrument (SSSI) is now in place to allow a pharmacist to substitute the prescribed labetalol 100mg with labetalol 200mg, if appropriate, without a new prescription.

With the substitution, one tablet of Presolol 100 is equivalent to half a tablet of Presolol 200.

If the patient does not have the cognitive or physical ability to halve the tablet, an alternative treatment may be more appropriate.

Sigma records 41% EBIT growth in FY25

SIGMA recorded normalised EBIT growth of 41% and statutory net profit after tax of \$529.9 million in its first post-merger end-ofyear results, according to an ASX statement this morning.

Key figures include like-for-like sales growth of 11.3% across the Australian Chemist Warehouse network, which now comprises 588 stores.

"The merger with Chemist Warehouse has delivered a stronger, more integrated healthcare business, with greater scale, capability, and market reach," said Sigma CEO and Managing Director Vikesh Ramsunder.

"The FY25 results demonstrate the group's momentum and potential for ongoing growth.

"Normalised EBIT for the year was up 41.4% compared to the prior corresponding period.'

Ramsunder said supply chain reliability and efficiencies were key to the group's success, with the benefit of scale resulting savings of 11% per unit cost to serve.

The Sigma group now has 881 franchise stores across Australia, and reported 35 new stores in Australia and internationally in FY25.

"Sigma is now a stronger more integrated healthcare business one with scale, capability, market reach and growth pathways," Ramsunder said.

"We have just started the journey to fully realise the benefits of the merger," he concluded.

Sigma also announced that CFO Mark Davis will be stepping down, and Damien Gance has resigned from his role as Chief Strategy and Business Development Officer.

In addition, Chemist Warehouse COO Mario Tascone has been appointed Deputy CEO of Retail across the combined group.

"This was the first earnings release after the Chemist Warehouse merger in Feb and the results highlighted the potential success of the partnership," Jamie

Allergy rates rise

MORE than eight million Australians (30%) now live with allergic disease, up from 4.1 million (19.6%) in 2007, according to a new Deloitte Access Economics report.

This amounts to \$18.9b in financial losses and \$44.6b in non-financial impacts each year.

Allergic disease is one of Australia's fastest growing chronic conditions, with hay fever, which affects around 24% of the population, food allergy (7%) and drug allergy (5%) among the most common.

There is an average financial cost of \$2,318 and a further \$5,470 of non-financial (wellbeing) costs per person living with an allergy.

The National Allergy Council (NAC), which provides education and support, and peak allergy research body the National Allergy Centre of Excellence (NACE) are leading Australia's coordinated national response to allergic disease.

The two bodies called for ongoing investment in their programs to reduce the burden of allergic disease for millions of Australians - the report is **HERE**.

Painkiller link with AMR

IN THE first study of its kind, Australian researchers have discovered that ibuprofen and paracetamol could be driving antimicrobial resistance (AMR) when used in conjunction with broadspectrum antibiotic ciprofloxacin.

The team from the University of South Australia looked at the interaction of ciprofloxacin with various non-antibiotic medications and *Escherichia coli* (E. coli), which causes gut and urinary tract infections.

Other drugs investigated were diclofenac, furosemide, metformin, atorvastatin, tramadol, temazepam and pseudoephedrine.

They found that ibuprofen and paracetamol significantly increased bacterial mutations, making E. coli highly resistant to the antibiotic.

According to the researchers, it is an important finding that has serious health implications, particularly for people in aged care homes, where multiple medications are regularly administered.

Lead researcher Associate Professor Rietie Venter said the findings raise important questions about the risks of polypharmacy in aged care.

"Antibiotics have long been vital

in treating infectious diseases, but their widespread overuse and misuse have driven a global rise in antibiotic-resistant bacteria," Assoc Prof Venter explained.

"This is especially prevalent in residential aged care facilities, where older people are more likely to be prescribed multiple medications - not just antibiotics, but also drugs for pain, sleep, or blood pressure - making it an ideal breeding ground for gut bacteria to become resistant to antibiotics.

"When bacteria were exposed to ciprofloxacin alongside ibuprofen and paracetamol, they developed more genetic mutations than with the antibiotic alone, helping them grow faster and become highly resistant," she continued.

"Worryingly, the bacteria were not only resistant to the antibiotic ciprofloxacin, but increased resistance was also observed to multiple other antibiotics from different classes."

The team also uncovered the genetic mechanisms behind this resistance, where the painkillers activated the bacteria's defences to expel antibiotics and render them less effective.

Call for expanded vaccination access

GENERAL practitioners are calling on the New South Wales Government to urgently expand free vaccination access state-wide, including an upcoming intranasal influenza vaccine for young children.

Less than a quarter of kids in NSW aged under five and fewer than 60% of patients aged over 65 are vaccinated against the flu, lagging the national average.

The RACGP is calling for expanded access to vaccinations, including full funding of flu vaccination for high-risk groups; intranasal flu vaccines for children aged two to five years; meningococcal B vaccines for those aged two years and under as well as 15-19-year-olds; and funding for respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) vaccines for those aged over 50.

Funding access to the new intranasal vaccine will help relieve the stresses many parents experience when it comes to giving small children an injection, the RACGP said.

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Dispensary Corner

AN ENTICING, if somewhat slippery headline tells us that 'quilty pleasures' can "reduce risk of diabetes, cancer, heart disease and even death".

And that's true, if your 'guilty pleasures' are red wine and dark chocolate, presumably in some sort of moderation.

However, if donuts, cigarettes and Vodka Cruisers are more your thing, then not so much.

The key to healthy 'quilty pleasures' is flavonoids, which include anthocyanins, flavonols, flavonones, flavon-3ols and flavones.

A large, long-term study found that people who consumed the widest variety of flavonoids, defined as an additional 6.7 flavonoid types per day, had a 14% lower risk of all-cause mortality and a 10% lower risk of cardiovascular disease.

Those who ate the widest variety of flavonoids also had a 20% reduced risk of type 2 diabetes, and an 8% reduced risk of cancer compared to those with the lowest variety.

In addition to dark chocolate and red wine, flavonoid-rich foods and drinks include tea, apples, berries, oranges and grapes - but the catch is you need to consume these as well as wine and chocolate for maximum benefit.

"This study is significant as the results indicate that consuming a higher quantity and wider diversity [of flavonoids] has the potential to lead to a greater reduction in ill health than just a single source," the study authors said.
