Cannabis use rises for disadvantaged

PEOPLE living in socially disadvantaged and regional areas of Australia are consuming significantly more cannabis than their counterparts in wealthier metropolitan towns and cities, a new study has found.

Combining large-scale wastewater analysis with national survey data to track cannabis use trends from 2018 to 2025, researchers found that intake has steadily risen across all communities.

The study showed that the most disadvantaged communities, as well as outer regional and remote areas, recorded more than double the consumption rates of the wealthiest areas, with calls for harm-reduction strategies to be tailored to the communities most affected.

"Higher consumption in disadvantaged and remote communities likely reflects a complex mix of attributes such as access to services, economic conditions and social norms," explained Dr Rory Verhagen of the University of Queensland.

"That gap has persisted over time, providing a rare, objective insight into population-level drug use and highlighting the need for targeted health responses," he added.

PSA chief steps down

The Board acknowledged Assoc Prof Morris' impact throughout his tenure with the organisation, including achievements and progress made on key strategic initiatives, membership growth, strengthened relationships with government and other stakeholders, and commitment to drive innovation in quality use of medicines and pharmacist practice.

PSA National President Assoc Prof Fei Sim said the organisation remains focused on stability and continuity as it enters the next phase of transformational growth, and thanked Assoc Prof Morris for his contribution.

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Dispensary Corner

IN EXCELLENT news just in time for the festive season, Swedish researchers have found that eating high fat cheeses and cream could reduce the chances of developing dementia.

In a study recently published in *Neurology*, the medical journal of the American Academy of Neurology, scientists revealed that people who indulged in 20g of heavy cream - roughly one-and-a-half tablespoons - had a 16% lower risk of dementia than those who consumed none.

Those who ate 50g of cheese daily reduced their chances by 13% compared to those who ate less than 15g a day.

In terms of vascular dementia, the risk of developing the condition was 29% lower for those who eat cheese.

Researchers analysed information from 27,670 seniors and tracked their health over a period of 25 years.

During that time, participants kept track of what they ate for one week, and reported on how much their diet had changed over the last few years.

"For decades, the debate over high-fat versus low-fat diets has shaped health advice, sometimes even categorising cheese as an unhealthy food to limit," says Dr Emily Sonestedt, an associate professor from Lund University, Sweden, who was the study's senior author.

"Our study found that some high-fat dairy products may actually lower the risk of dementia, challenging some long-held assumptions about fat and brain health."

Narrative of safer nicotine must end, experts say

A NEW expert consensus report by international researchers has concluded that nicotine is toxic for the heart and blood vessels, regardless of whether it is consumed via a vape, pouch, shisha or cigarette.

The team looked at every existing study investigating harms of all nicotine products, representing the first attempt to consider the drug's effects beyond just smoking.

Among the key findings were that nicotine is a potent cardiovascular toxin that causes damage to the heart and blood vessels and high blood pressure, regardless of the delivery system, with no nicotine-containing product being a safe option in terms of heart health.

The researchers also determined that passive exposure to smoke, vape and heated tobacco emissions causes vascular harm.

A dramatic rise in the use

of vapes, heated tobacco and nicotine pouches was reported, particularly among adolescents and young adults, and three-quarters of young adult vapers had never smoked before

The team cautioned that vapes and pouches are not effective cessation tools, but rather an entry point to smoking and often lead to use alongside cigarettes.

Urgent action is needed to curb the growing number of adolescents and young people becoming addicted to nicotine, the authors said, with a ban on flavours and social media and influencer advertising, and effective taxation and regulation across all nicotine products.

"This paper is a wake-up call for regulators," said co-author Professor Thomas Luscher from Royal Brompton & Harefield Hospitals, London, UK.



"The shift from cigarettes to e-cigarettes and flavoured pouches is not effective harm reduction; it is rather a transformation of addiction strategies," he continued.

"The science is clear: the cardiovascular toxicity of nicotine is evidence-based by now.

"The duty now lies with legislators to protect the public, especially children, from a new epidemic of addiction and disease," Professor Luscher concluded.
