Long COVID cure?

NEW research from the University of California has found that a 15-day course of Paxloid, a widely available antiviral, may help ease symptoms of long COVID.

Five out of 13 patients (38%) showed sustained improvement, while nearly all benefited in the shortterm, with relief experienced for persistent symptoms like respiratory issues, fatigue, brain fog, and body aches.

"This is not a silver bullet, but it may help a lot of people in a meaningful way," said the study's lead author and an epidemiologist, Dr Alison Cohen - read the paper HERE.

A FOURTH 24-hour pharmacy in South Australia is a step closer to reality, with the State Government opening submissions of interest to community pharmacies in Adelaide's outer southern suburbs. First announced in Nov last year (PD 05 Nov 2024), the move is set to provide South Australians with even more access to roundthe-clock healthcare, with timely

medicines and advice available 24 hours a day, seven days a week, including public holidays. More than 170,000 people

visited the existing three 24/7 pharmacies - Salisbury Plain Chemist Warehouse, Clovelly Park **Chemist Warehouse and National** Pharmacies at Norwood - during the extended opening hours since they began in Feb and Mar last year (PD 05 Feb 2024).

Combined, the three pharmacies have dispensed more than 69,000 scripts during the additional opening hours and provided advice on more than 7,000 phone calls.



SA Health Chief Pharmacist Naomi Burgess said, "the success of the 24/7 pharmacies in South Australia is clear so we are pleased to be progressing to the next stage of introducing a fourth location".

"The 24/7 pharmacies provide the community with access to medicines, expert advice and a range of services from a pharmacist round the clock, often providing care when other health professionals are not available.

"This 24/7 service offers peace

of mind for people while helping to reduce demand on our busy emergency departments."

According to customer feedback, around 20% of customers would have visited an emergency department if the 24/7 pharmacy was not available.

Applications from eligible pharmacies in the suburbs of Hallett Cove, Sheidow Park and Trott Park to become the fourth 24/7 pharmacy in SA close on 30 Jan 2025 at 2.00pm (ACDST). JM

A WORRYING new fitness trend has gone viral on TikTok, prompting experts to warn people against trying the '75-Hard' challenge.

The strict plan instructs participants to hit the gym twice a day and drink an 'extreme' amount of water over the span of two-and-a-half months.

Although the challenge was created by US-based author and podcaster Andy Frisella in 2019, it is currently taking social media by storm as many look to increase their fitness in the New Year, with more than a million video clips shared by users who are trying out the trend.

Frisella instructs participants to drink a whopping 4.5 litres per day - that's more than two times the recommended amount - and sweating it out for not one, but *two* 45-minute workout sessions on the daily.

While it is hopefully obvious to most that this plan is neither sustainable nor especially sensible, some TikTok users are touting the benefits.

According to experts though, the plan could lead to some pretty dire health problems.

"If you drink too much water you become over-hydrated and become hyponatraemic, which is when your concentration of salts becomes too low," said Professor Peter Watt, a sports and exercise science expert at the University of Brighton.

"This can cause other issues with your blood pressure and overall health" - with seizures and even a coma being among the worst-case scenarios.

Iron injection trial

A MAJOR iron trial has shown, for the first time, that a single iron infusion in late pregnancy can significantly boost iron stores in pregnant women, outperforming the efficacy of iron tablets.

Co-led by the Walter and Eliza Hall Institute of Medical Research in Victoria, the study found that women receiving infusions had a lower anaemia prevalence (46.7%) versus those receiving iron tablets (62.7%) at the time of delivery.

Additionally, it discovered that a third-trimester infusion protected a mother's iron stores, even postpartum.

"While anaemia is one of the most avoidable causes of illness and death in resource-poor nations, any woman across the world can become anaemic during pregnancy, highlighting how this remains a global priority," said co-corresponding author Prof. Sant-Rayn Pasricha.

According to Pasricha, the study offers the first concrete evidence proving that infusions in late pregnancy are the best treatment for combatting anaemia in expectant mothers.

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
