Update for Pharmacists in Alfred's path

THE Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme (PBS) has extended the Continued Dispensing Emergency Measure it put in place to help flood-affected people in Far North Queensland to include those who may be impacted by Tropical Cyclone Alfred in coming days.

Having taken effect from 04 Feb, the measure will be in place until 31 Mar 2025 (inclusive) and allows people to continue to access their PBS subsidised medicines.

It permits the supply of an eligible medicine to a person by an approved pharmacist, where there is an immediate need for the medicine, but the PBS prescriber is unable to be contacted and/or is unable to provide an electronic PBS prescription or owing prescription.

The patient must have been supplied with the medicine within the last three months and their condition must be stable.

The PBS Continued Dispensing Emergency Measure provides access to a wider range of




PBS medicines than under ongoing Continued Dispensing arrangements, covering most medicines on the General Schedule of the PBS.

MEANWHILE, the Guild has provided some tips to share with patients about how to plan and prepare for Cyclone Alfred:

- Ensure prescriptions for essential medications are up to date to avoid unnecessary travel or hospital presentations.
- Prepare an emergency kit that contains all medical and health

supplies for seven days: consider first aid items, essential medicines and prescriptions, infant supplies, sanitary products, thermometers, batteries, and chargers for medical devices.

- Ensure patients plan ahead and charge medical devices and batteries now, so they can maintain power.
- Patients with medications that require refrigeration should be assisted in identifying alternative storage methods, such as cold bags, if power is lost. KB

Treat both partners to stop BV: study

BACTERIAL vaginosis (BV), a condition affecting nearly a third of women worldwide, causing infertility, premature births and newborn deaths, has been revealed to be a sexually transmitted infection (STI), paving the way for a revolution in how it is treated.

The usual practice of treating BV as an imbalance (disruption) to the vaginal microbiome means that more than 50% of women get it back within three months after the standard week-long treatment of an oral antibiotic.

But in a landmark study of 164 couples with BV in monogamous relationships, Monash University and Alfred Health researchers found that treating BV in both sexual partners simultaneously achieves significantly higher cure rates than the current practice of only treating women.

The researchers stopped the trial early when it became clear that BV recurrence was halved

in the partner treatment group versus treating only women.

"Our trial has shown that reinfection from partners is causing a lot of the BV recurrence women experience, and provides evidence that BV is in fact an STI," said author Professor Catriona Bradshaw.

"This successful intervention is relatively cheap and short and has the potential for the first time to not only improve BV cure for women, but opens up exciting new opportunities for BV prevention, and prevention of the serious complications associated with BV."

The Melbourne Sexual Health Centre, where the study was conducted, has already changed its clinical practice to treat couples, and a new website for health professionals and consumers provides prescribing information for partner treatment.

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Dispensary Corner

THERE is some good news for those of us who love to sleep in, with new research revealing that a Sunday morning lie-in is actually good for your health.

People who spend up to two hours longer in bed on the weekend may halve their risk of depression, a study has found.

Conducted by researchers at Chengdu University in China and published in the *Journal of Affective Disorders*, the study analysed 327,000 men and women, and found that an extra hour in bed on Sundays was linked with a 30% lower risk of depression, increasing to 62% for between one and two hours.

The benefits stopped after an extra two hours, so unfortunately there is still no excuse to stay in bed until noon.

The scientists also discovered that extra snoozing has particular benefits for men and those aged between 40 and 60, who may not get enough sleep during the week as they balance work and family life.

Making up for lost sleep on the weekend can help offset low mood, poor concentration, weight gain, a weakened immune system, and even a reduced lifespan - talk about a guilt-free excuse to hit that snooze button.



NSAIDs prevent dementia



PEOPLE who use anti-inflammatory drugs over a long period of time may be at a lower risk of dementia regardless of the dosage, according to a Dutch study published in the *Journal of the American Geriatrics Society*.

Past research has suggested that inflammation may contribute to the development and progression of dementia, and that nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory (NSAID) medications may help protect against dementia due to their anti-inflammatory effects.

In this large, new prospective study, a research team followed the NSAID usage of almost 12,000 people from 1991-2020 with an average age of 66 at the start.

By the end of the study, around 2,000 had developed dementia.

Long-term NSAID use (more than two years) was associated with a 12% reduced risk of developing dementia, but shortand intermediate-term use did not provide benefits.

The researchers said there was a link between long-term use of NSAIDs and a lower risk of developing dementia, but there was no association between the overall dosage of NSAID medication

taken and dementia risk.

The researchers say this means prolonged exposure to NSAIDs may have potential for dementia prevention, rather than intensive exposure to the drugs.

The association could not be explained by the amyloid-lowering properties of specific NSAIDs, the researchers added.

"Although our results are an indication of the important role of inflammation in the treatment of dementia, they do not justify the recommendation of long-term treatment with NSAIDs for the prevention of dementia, given its potential adverse effects," the team cautioned, noting that NSAIDs are currently listed as potentially inappropriate medications in older adults.

"Our study provides evidence on possible preventive effects of anti-inflammatory medication against the dementia process," said author Professor M Arfan Ikram of University Medical Center Rotterdam, in the Netherlands.

"There is a need for more studies to further consolidate this evidence and possibly develop preventive strategies," he added.
