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# First Nations leadership change

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# Dispensary Corner

**URINATING** in the shower is more than just a dirty little secret - it could cause kidney damage, say some experts.

American urogynaecologist Dr Teresa Irwin told her TikTok followers that urinating while showering trains the brain to link the sound of running water with needing to urinate - a Pavlovian response - potentially resulting in incontinence.

"Every time you're washing your hands, taking a shower, washing the dishes, if there is running water, your bladder is going to be 'salivating' because it wants to go and pee," Dr Irwin explained.

"In the long term, this can mess with the body's internal bladder control, leading to frequent rushes to the toilet."

Another TikTokking urology expert, Dr Alicia Jeffrey-Thomas, pointed out that women who pee in the shower can risk urinary tract infections and even kidney failure.

This is because urinating while standing puts pelvic floor muscles - which can't relax under extra strain.

This can lead to the bladder failing to empty, called urinary retention, which potentially causes a health problems.

However, Welsh urological surgeon Dr Jay Khastgir dismissed these concerns, pointing out that link between the urge to pee and the sound of running water is anecdotal, and there's no evidence that standing to pee has a detrimental effect on bladder emptying.

# Pill testing call after nitazenes found in meds

IN THE wake of fresh warnings regarding the presence of the dangerous synthetic opioid nitazene in pharmaceuticals, the Royal Australian College of GPs (RACGP) is calling on state and territory governments to embrace drug testing services to save lives.

Nitazene was recently detected in fake pharmaceuticals, including counterfeit pain medications, by the Australian Federal Police (AFP).

It was also identified last month by Queensland's drug testing service CheQpoint, which no longer operates after the government shut down testing services (PD 09 Apr).

RACGP alcohol and other drug spokesperson, Dr Marguerite Tracy, said that the AFP warning highlights the urgent need for drug testing services.

"Drug testing services, otherwise known as 'pill testing' services, save lives," she said.

"Nitazene is an immensely powerful and dangerous drug that is often sold to people as a legitimate pharmaceutical.

"This latest advice from the AFP is very concerning, because people taking counterfeit pharmaceuticals just don't know what they're consuming, including deadly substances such as synthetic opioids," Dr Tracy said.

She pointed out that fixed-site drug testing services allow people to visit at any time, and are "a sensible harm reduction measure, because it at least gives them some idea of what they're taking".

The RACGP would also like to see awareness of naloxone enhanced,



and put in the hands of people likely to experience, or witness, an overdose, including young people at schools and in youth services, and to be made available in first-aid kits.

Dr Tracy said that Australia is making progress, with a fixedsite service in the ACT and music festival testing in NSW and Vic, but a greater expansion of services is desperately needed. KB

# Primary care focus for Voices in Agreement

AT THE second Voices in Agreement session held yesterday, Advanced Pharmacy Australia (AdPha) discussed preliminary recommendation themes around primary care with stakeholders as part of its co-governance role toward a new pharmacy programs agreement.

The session heard from medical, nursing, indigenous, rural and consumer stakeholder groups, including representatives from the Australian Medical Association (AMA); the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners (RACGP); National **Aboriginal Community Controlled** Health Organisation (NACCHO); the National Rural Health Alliance; and the Consumers Health Forum of Australia.

AdPha President Tom Simpson said the consultation series reinforces the notion that while

the programs are highly valued, they can be improved.

"To ensure greater accessibility, safety and efficacy of our pharmacy programs, we need greater integration of specialty pharmacists and broader GP-pharmacist collaboration, continuity of care embedded in program design and expanded referral and escalation pathways," Simpson said.

"In addition, we are seeing alignment on defining the health outcomes of programs, more innovative place-based funding solutions, crosschecking medication-related hospitalisation data and the application of Indigenous data governance principles."

Simpson added that the diverse expertise on board will ensure stronger pharmacy programs that wrap around the patient.

# **Immunisation** handbook updates

**THE** Department of Health and Aged Care has advised of updates to the chapters on COVID and vaccination procedures in the Australian Immunisation Handbook.

The COVID updates include increased clarity of recommendations, a revised immunocompromising and medical conditions list to align with other chapters, and outdated products removed.

Guidance for preparing for vaccination, administration of vaccines and post-vaccination advice has also been updated.

This includes the screening checklist, dealing with vaccine administration errors and potential side effects and complications of vaccines.

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
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
