Next stage for new CPD standards

PUBLIC consultation has closed for the Pharmaceutical Society of Australia's (PSA) Standards for Continuing Professional Development (CPD) for pharmacists, marking the next step in finalising the new CPD standards.

The new standards will be used to assess the quality and applicability of education for pharmacists before accreditation, and will transition from the Australian Pharmacy Council's (APC) standards that are set to be retired on 31 Dec 2025 (PD 30 Jun).

PSA's CPD Manager, Chloe Tobin, said feedback to the consultation showed a commitment from the profession for "robust, high-quality training", and strong support for the draft standards.

"Respondents valued the concise and clear structure, as well as the inclusion of guidance information," Tobin said.

"Stakeholders also expressed strong support for the standard's focus on independence and



practical applicability to pharmacy practice," she continued.

"When a pharmacist selects PSA Accredited CPD activities, they can be confident the education they access is of high quality, upholds pharmacy practice standards, guidelines and ethics, and is free from commercial bias."

More information about the PSA's Accredited CPD scheme will be available in Jan 2026, with the new standards to be published in Dec.

CPD activities which have been accredited against the current APC CPD Accreditation Standards will remain accredited until their expiry date, or up until 31 Dec 2026, whichever is earlier. KB

New BP combo med on PBS

ARROTEX Pharmaceuticals has announced the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme (PBS) listing of ARX-Telmisartan/Amlodipine, a new brand of fixed-dose combination therapy for the management of hypertension.

"Combination therapies such as this simplify treatment regimens

With the originator and authorised generic brands of the Telmisartan/ Amlodipine combination set to be discontinued in coming months, the Arrotex brand provides another alternative for patients, and is a further addition to Arrotex's cardiometabolic medicines portfolio.

Scope in focus

Professor Trent Twomey

MANY readers will be aware that the Pharmacy Board is working to establish a formal endorsement model for pharmacist prescribing.

Getting this model right is pivotal to creating a nationally consistent framework supporting safe, accessible care in community pharmacies across Australia.

This matters for our profession. We must ensure the right model is adopted - one that improves workforce mobility, service delivery, and professional development.

Autonomous, or independent, prescribing has already been shown to work internationally.

It has been proven to be safe, and to reduce GP waiting times and unnecessary hospital admissions.

Yet, as pharmacists, we continue to see misinformation spread by groups claiming to represent doctors.

Some pharmacists may feel uncertain about how to maintain good relationships with their local GPs while expanding the services they offer.

On the ground, the reality is very different.

Prescribing pharmacists across the country are working closely with GPs.

They share patient information and collaborate within their training and expertise to support better health outcomes.

Pharmacists are well placed to provide consultations for uncomplicated UTIs, to initiate hormonal contraception, and treat everyday health conditions like impetigo or otitis externa.

Prescribing pharmacists can also triage and refer patients to other parts of the health system when a condition is more complex or beyond their scope of practice.

This fosters constructive GPpharmacist relationships.

GPs will soon realise that pharmacists are not trying to replace them but rather value their expertise, and have received additional clinical training to approach consultations differently.

Pharmacists need an endorsement model that enables autonomous prescribing.

It's right that we push to serve our patients to the full extent of our training, skills and experience.

And on the ground, we will continue to work with our GP colleagues to ensure patients can access healthcare safely and conveniently through their community pharmacy.

Pregnancy vitamins reduce autism risk

RESEARCH from Curtin University in WA has linked folic acid and multivitamin supplements during pregnancy with reduced risk of autism spectrum disorder (ASD) in kids.

The team analysed studies that looked at prenatal folic acid or multivitamin supplementation during pregnancy.

They found that maternal prenatal multivitamin supplementation was associated with a 34% reduced risk of ASD, while folic acid was associated with a 30% reduced risk.

Obstetrics and gynaecology professor David Ellwood of Griffith University said the review was timely, and "of considerable interest given that it comes on the back of recent concerns about a possible link between maternal paracetamol ingestion

"One issue not discussed is



if these results should lead to recommending folate supplementation throughout pregnancy, as opposed to current guidelines aimed at reducing the risk of neural tube defects by taking periconceptional folate," Professor Ellwood noted.

"The authors discuss the biological plausibility of how ASD could be influenced by folate supplementation, but if the mechanisms involve an effect beyond the periconceptional period, it may be that supplementation should continue beyond this time."

Dispensary Corner

SETTING goals is good, but letting go of them can sometimes be better, according to Aussie research.

While persistence is important, working towards unachievable targets could have a negative impact on overall wellbeing, leading to higher stress, poorer wellbeing and even physical health costs such as illness.

But neither should you cave at the first obstacle.

Lead researcher Dr Hugh Riddell, from the Curtin School of Population Health, said the study showed quitting isn't always a sign of weakness.

The research, which was published in *Nature Human Behaviour*, found letting go of unattainable goals was linked to reduced stress, anxiety, and depression, while shifting to new goals was found to restore wellbeing and life satisfaction.

"Changing how you pursue your goals by being flexible rather than rigid could help people stay resilient and still have a focus in their lives, even if it has changed," Dr Riddell said.

He noted the importance of individual differences, saying "motivation, age, stress management, strength of relationships, experiences growing up, health status and more were all found to play a part in how we approach goals".

The trick is knowing when to stick to a plan, or whether it's time to abandon or change unreachable goals - something Dr Riddell hopes to address in future research.


