## Call for multidisciplinary model

GENERAL practice care is changing to meet the needs of patients in Australia, with coordinated general practice-led multidisciplinary teams providing more comprehensive, patient centred care, according to the 2025 Royal Australian College of GPs (RACGP) Health of the Nation report, which will be released next week.

The report reveals that 91% of GPs agree multidisciplinary team care improves patient outcomes, and 57% of GPs are already working in multidisciplinary team care arrangements, especially outside of major metropolitan centres.

General practice multidisciplinary care teams can include a variety of health professionals, including pharmacists, podiatrists, physiotherapists, dietitians and nurses, as well as diverse specialists,

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offering comprehensive care for patients with complex needs.

"We know that well-resourced, general practice-led multidisciplinary teams can lead to improved patient health outcomes, and this is particularly important in an age where we are facing more chronic and complex health conditions," said RACGP President Dr Michael Wright.

"General practice is all about knowing patients and their histories and considering all aspects of their health - working in a multidisciplinary care team allows GPs to provide more patient-centred and holistic care for our patients," he stated.

Dr Wright noted that patients were also reported to be happy with the shift towards more coordinated care, and that nearly two-thirds of GPs want to participate in more multidisciplinary team care.

"To do this, they need funding and support to better meet patient needs," he said, calling on the government to fund and evaluate innovative GP-led multidisciplinary team models of care to "ensure all patients can access quality, coordinated care close to home". KB

### Stock check tool

PHARMACIES can keep better track of stock levels via a new tech solution rolled out last week by Pharmx.

The new StockView feature has been designed to address operational pain points associated with stock levels.

Availability across more than 120,000 products from hundreds of suppliers has been loaded into the new StockView solution, including all major wholesalers.

Pharmx said the new solution streamlines workflows, reduces order failures and enhances patient care by ensuring pharmacies do not run out of stock at critical times.

Using the tool, pharmacies can search Pharmx's catalogue, view stock levels from suppliers and receive instant email alerts when unavailable items are included in an order.

Customer research conducted by Pharmx has identified order failures as the primary operational challenge.

The company recorded 10 million failed orders in FY25, resulting in more than \$2 billion in stock unavailable.

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## Dispensary Corner

IT IS a well-known fact that having a pet can boost your wellbeing, but as it turns out, owning a dog can reduce the chances of developing childhood asthma.

A study from the Hospital for Sick Children in Toronto, Canada, found that babies who grow up with a pet dog are half as likely to develop the condition.

The researchers analysed dust samples from the homes of 1,050 babies aged three to four months and tracked them until they were five years old.

Over this period, 6.6% were diagnosed with asthma.

Analysis revealed babies exposed to higher levels of the allergen Can f1, which is shed in dog skin and saliva, had a 48% lower risk of developing the lung condition, compared with other babies.

"Early exposure to dog allergens could prevent sensitisation, perhaps by altering the nasal microbiome - the mixture of microbes living inside the nose - or by some effect on the immune system," said study author Dr Jacob McCoy.

Unfortunately for feline lovers, the protective effect was only found to be present in



## Naloxone awareness, uptake rise

THE Drug Trends program at the National Drug and Alcohol Research Centre (NDARC), UNSW Sydney, has released findings from its annual national surveys of people who use drugs, with encouraging trends around awareness and uptake of opioid antagonist naloxone.

The medication is freely available without a prescription from pharmacies and can quickly and safely reverse the effects of an opioid overdose, whether pharmaceutical or illicit.

It was found that 73% of people who used drugs like ecstasy and 86% of people who inject drugs said that they had heard of naloxone, an increase from 63% and 80% in 2024, respectively.

In terms of uptake, 19% of people who use drugs like ecstasy and 55% of people who inject drugs reported obtaining naloxone in the past year, and one-third (32%) of those who inject drugs reported that they had resuscitated someone using naloxone at least once in their lifetime, up from 27% in 2024.

"Opioid overdoses can be prevented, and take-home naloxone is a proven way to save lives," said Associate Professor Amy

"In Australia, we are seeing more cases where drugs like cocaine and methamphetamine are being mixed with very strong opioids, or where products are made to look like legitimate medicines but unexpectedly contain an opioid.

"This means that people with little or no tolerance to opioids are being unintentionally and unknowingly exposed and are at higher risk of overdose.

"Because of the risk of unintentionally consuming opioids or using stronger-than-expected doses, having naloxone on hand is a practical way to reduce harm." KB

## Dr Al predicts when to stop antidepressants

RESEARCHERS at the University of South Australia (UniSA) have developed new machine learning models to help clinicians identify when patients can successfully stop using long-term antidepressants.

Using artificial intelligence (AI) to track dispensing data from the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme (PBS), the team identified the most successful cases of deprescription among 100,000 patients who were prescribed antidepressants over a 10-year period.

"Healthcare providers are often reluctant to cease antidepressant prescriptions due to their concerns about withdrawal effects, making it difficult for doctors to know who can safely discontinue treatment," said study lead Dr Lasantha Ranwala.

The researchers said the findings could give clinicians a useful decision-support tool to help them initiate antidepressant deprescription.

## Trump pharma tariff announcement creates market jitters

US PRESIDENT Donald Trump announced on social media last Fri that a 100 percent tariff will be imposed on US imports of branded or patented pharmaceutical products from 01 Oct (PD breaking news).

President Trump offered foreign pharmaceutical companies an out if they build a manufacturing plant in the US.

Australian pharmaceutical exports to the US were worth around \$2.1 billion last year, with

plasma and other blood products from CSL being a significant share of that.

CSL share prices dropped sharply after the announcement, before rallying soon after to regain much of the lost ground.

CSL said in a statement it was aware of the tariffs and was "actively monitoring further announcements".

The company also noted that it has a significant manufacturing footprint in the US, and is

planning further expansion.

"As per previous market guidance, we do not expect any material impact from these tariffs," the company stated.

Australian cancer diagnostic manufacturer Telix Pharmaceuticals, which also supplies the US market, experienced a share price drop, but said it did not expect any impact from the tariffs as most of its workforce was already based in the US.
